

Cemetery Property Guide

What you are buying at Washington Memorial Park, what it costs, and what else is on the quote.

What you own here

Cemetery property is sold as the **exclusive right to use a particular space as a resting place**. The document you receive is a Certificate of Interment Rights, and the cemetery continues to own and care for the grounds. Your right does not expire, and it passes to your family if you never use it.

THE KINDS OF PROPERTY HERE



Ground burial spaces

TRADITIONAL BURIAL • THE LARGEST PART OF THE PARK

A lawn space in one of the numbered gardens, each with its own outlook.

MOST GARDENS

\$6,995–\$9,995

Across the numbered gardens the full range is \$4,995–\$18,995



Mausoleum crypts

ABOVE-GROUND ENTOMBMENT • INDOORS OR OUTDOORS

Entombment above ground, indoors or in a garden court.

MOST CRYPTS

\$15,995–\$28,995

In the Chapel of Memories the full range is \$9,895–\$61,990. Ask me about the other buildings.



Columbarium niches

FOR CREMATED REMAINS • GRANITE OR GLASS FRONT

A compartment for urns behind a granite faceplate or a glass front. Every niche here holds two.

MOST NICHES

\$9,895–\$14,000

Across all six columbariums the full range is \$3,850–\$82,500



Cremation posts and benches

TERRACE GARDEN MEMORIAL PATH • NEWEST PART OF THE PARK

Granite posts, boulders and benches along the new path.

MOST PLACEMENTS

\$8,000–\$42,000

Along the whole path the full range is \$8,000–\$52,000



Urn gardens

GROUND BURIAL OF AN URN · AT THE FRONT OF THE PARK

Ground burial for cremated remains in a garden built for it, marked the same way a lawn space is. One urn per space.

The space is one line. These are the others.

None are hidden, but families are rarely told about them until they are being asked to sign.

Endowment care fund

A permanent fund whose earnings maintain the grounds. Required by Washington state on every sale.

Opening and closing

Preparing the space before the service and closing it afterward. Differs by type of interment.

Recording fee

Entering the interment permanently in the cemetery record. Charged once per interment.

Outer burial container or vault

Surrounds the casket or urn and supports the ground above it. Required for ground interment.

Vault setting

Placing the container in the space. Separate from the container itself.

Memorial and its installation

The marker or inscription, and the work of setting it. Granite markers here are priced all-inclusive.

Washington sales tax

Applies to merchandise and installation. The space, endowment care, opening and closing, and recording are exempt.

Timing surcharges

Friday through Sunday, holidays, and interments after three in the afternoon each carry a surcharge.

Endowment care: the principal is never spent

This is the charge families question most. Washington state requires a portion of every property sale to be set aside in a permanent fund, and only the income may be used. Bonney Watson deposits **15% for ground property and 10% for niches and crypts**. It is paid once, it is not an annual fee, and its earnings tend these grounds for as long as the park exists.

TWO THINGS FAMILIES ASK

Can two people be buried in one space?

A space is sold for one casket interment. A casket and an urn can share a space, so a couple where one chooses cremation can rest together. Cremated remains can also be added later as a second or third right of interment.

Two caskets in one space is possible in some sections, but it is the exception rather than the rule. It depends on the space, so ask me and I will find out for you.

What happens if I move out of state?

Your rights stay yours no matter where you live. Many families who moved decades ago still return here. If you would rather be closer to where you are now, you can transfer or sell the property, and we will handle the paperwork either way.
